Jared Alden, a psychiatrist at the German Neuroscience Centre in Unbail Healthcare City, said trenage reswere bidingstheir condition from parents and teachers.

"I don't think alot of the children and young adults who are suffering from eating disorders are selding treatment," Mr Alden said.

"I think children are keeping it a secret and they are able to do so, even from close family members."

He said eating disorders were not gender specific and could affect both espatriates and Emiratis. But expats were more likely to identify an eating disorder in a family member, Mr Alden said.

order are profound, Mr Alden said. "The trouble is because someone is young they don't immediately show up. Some conditions won't even ap-pear until their late forties but it has very big effect." The National Association of Ano-

rexia Nervosa and Associated Dis orders estimates that 11 per cent of high school pupils have been found

high school pupils have been found to have an eating disorder. Eating disorders have the highest mortaliyrate of any mental illness. Such disorders, especially anorexia, can have many health consequences, said Ruba Rizk, a consultant physician in adolescent medicine at Sheikh Khalifa Medical City.

Majority of travellers favour ban on all ivory products

DUBAI//A survey of more than 900 travellers at Dubai International Airport found most agreed with a complete ban on all elephant ivory products.

However, approaching Asian travellers was not easy, said Ahmed AbouZahra, the IFAW's campaigns and communications officer.
"So many of them were afraid to get involved, even to give their opinion." He noted people were also mistaken about the impact of the ivory trade, with some belie-ing the animals were alive at the time their tuskswere taken. Conservationists say use of ivor encourages poaching, with at least 35,000 elephants a year be-ing killed to supply the trade.

least 35,000 elephants a year be-ing killed to supply the trade. Under UAE law, people caught smuggling endangered animals or animal parts face jall sentences of up to six months, fines of up to Dh50,000 or both.

Protection measures aimed at reducing poaching had significant success in the 1990s, although elephants are once again being targeted due to the high demand for their tusks.

According to a UN report, Elephants in the Dust: The African Elephant Crisis, the trend has intensified since 2007. In 2011, about 17,000 elephant deaths were recorded at sites monitored by scientists in Africa with the number for the entire continent believed to be as high as 25,000.

25,000. In many countries, especially those in Central and West Africa, the number of animals targeted by poachers exceeds the growth rates of the population.

#### NOT ALLOWED TO MOVE EX-WIFE

A man who asked a court to A man who asked a court to allow him to move his former wife and their two children out of the UAE has had his case re-jected. The Cassation Court in Abu Dhabi ruled that it was not in the best interests of the chilen or their mother, who had legal custody of them. Court records did not show to which records did not show to which country the main intended to take them. The man unsuccess-tully took his case to the First instance Court of Personal Sta-tuses, and then to the Appeals Court. The Cassation Court again rejected the claim.

#### RECRUITMENT FEES TO BE STUDIED

The Ministry of Interior is conducting a study on the costs of recruitment flees for domestic workers. The study will compare fees imposed by UAE-based domestic labour agencies with other Arabian Gulf states, said Brig Gen Rashed AlKhodr, deputy head of the department of Nationality, Residency and Ports.
